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

Year 12 Essential English


This week the students have continued to develop the skills and knowledge required for the upcoming Common Internal Assessment (CIA). Students have been engaging with a wide range of stimulus texts and practicing their exam responses in mock exams. Student have also been exposed to previous years exam responses to learn about how their responses will be marked. The CIA is an exam set by the Queensland Curriculum and Assessment Authority but administered and marked on campus, all students in Queensland who are enrolled in Essential English will complete this exam. The exam consists of two parts, the first part being the SEEN stimulus (a written text which students will receive in Week 5) and the UNSEEN stimulus, which will be a visual text.

The exam is 90 minutes in total but broken down into 2 x 45 minute sessions (with 7 minutes planning time for each session). The main concepts of the exam are as follows;

- Identifying and explaining values, attitudes, beliefs and cultural assumptions in texts
- Identifying and explaining how representations are constructed by the text creator
- Identifying and explaining how text structures and language features influence how the audience think and feel about the information presented in the text.

To support student success for the exam, students have access to PowerPoints (which explain the concepts listed above) and practice exam on the TEAMS page.


Year 12 Essential Math

Next week the students will be given the Task and Criteria sheet for their assessment item for the term which is a multi - modal speech. Year 11 Essential Math

Students exploring reading variety of graphs to represent data also choosing the correct type of graph for the information provided. Last two lessons students have been learning to use technology such as Excel to organize data and to plot graphs. This will be an essential skill to have for their PSMT work which commences next week. So all Year 11 students will be busy for the next 4 weeks getting it done and potentially getting good grades.

Year 12 Social and Community Studies

Students this fortnight have continued to explore the world of money and finance as they prepare for their exam in week 9. In class students have been looking at setting financial goals, evaluating different investment options and analysing the pros and cons of credit. In addition, students have looked at how people in the third world manage their limited resources to carve out a living and used this as an opportunity to reflect on the opportunities we are fortunate to share here in Australia. As always, we continue to encourage students to participate fully in class as we cover the topics that will appear in the exam. Watch this space for news of a fantastic upcoming incursion!

Year 11 Social and Community Studies

The past few weeks have been interesting in SCS. We have been working on Cover Letters toward assessment – using those skills we will need for future job applications. Lots of young people have realized how important it is to personalise a Cover Letter to match the job you are applying for – having a generic one for every job just doesn't cut it.

We have also been learning about the structure of organisations – using examples of big businesses we know about: McDonalds, Tesla and Microsoft. This ties into working for bigger businesses and growing an understanding about how these businesses operate and where your young person, as an entry level employee fits into the big picture!

12F update

The students have reached the point in the term where they will be given the Task and Criteria sheet for the coming assessment, which is a speech which communicates what they have discovered about an employer's view on a range of workplace issues. The students have previously sent out a survey to a particular employer and are reading through those responses in class. The speech is a multi-modal presentation and students are reminded that they will not be asked to present in front of the class. Non-State Schools Transport Assistance Scheme:

The Non-State Schools Transport Assistance Scheme provides financial assistance for families transporting students to non-state schools in Queensland. The Non-State Schools Transport Assistance Scheme (NSSTAS), a joint initiative of QCEC and ISQ, funded by the State Government and administered by QCECNSSTAS has two programs available to Queensland residents.

Bus Fare Assistance Program (BFAP): Provides a rebate above a nominated weekly threshold in fares to eligible families outside the Brisbane City Council boundary.

Students With Disability (SWD): Provides financial assistance to families of those students whose disability necessitates transport assistance to and from a non-state school by means that consider their disability.
