Welcome to week 4, can you believe it's nearly halfway through the term already! The last fortnight has seen a lot of changes, new students, industry speakers and the finalising of the certificate of occupancy for the long-awaited stage 2 to be opened to students. I'd like to thank both staff and students for their patience in this space as we navigate the complexities of this matter, we are hoping that the release of the new recreation space will provide students a much-needed outlet to release their energy. The school also had the privilege of hosting the Redlands Jobs Committee and the Redlands Chamber of Commerce on Tuesday afternoon (special thanks to Grace and Toni for supporting this). We are very excited to be working along side these groups to support BUSY Schools students enter into School Based Apprentiships/Traineeships and Further Employment once they have graduated.

The School bus that has been in operation this term is proving to be an excellent investment, however, some scheduling problems are being experienced and I would like to take this opportunity to reinforce the conditions around using the free bus service. Our BUSY bus picks up from Cleveland Station each morning and leaves the station at 8:10 sharp. This is so that students have time to get to school, prepare and eat breakfast before the start of classes at 8:30. Should a student miss the 8:10 pick up time, they are expected to make their own way to school. There is a bus service through Transdev (easily accessed through Translink journey planner) that will take you to the bus stop at Redlands Hospital and then it's just a short walk to our campus. Naturally, this same service is available in the afternoon. The BUSY bus leaves at 2:50 and prioritises the students who have connecting buses to catch from Cleveland station. We would appreciate everyone's support in ensuring the continued smooth running of this BUSY Schools facility.

I would also like to extend my appreciation and gratitude to Toni Banfield (Executive Principal) and the whole team for supporting the week in my absence due to some sudden and unexpected surgery.



What's Happening in the Classroom

Essential Mathematics



In Essential Mathematics students have been engaged in the topic of Managing Money. This has allowed for the learning of different ways people earn money, Tax, super and budgeting. This has been a great topic to cover as it is such a real-world topic and the engagement of the students with their questioning and work being completed has been fantastic. Next week they will be getting their assessment task which is a Problem solving and modelling task based on the current topic and the next on time and motion.

Essential English

In Essential English students are preparing for their first assessment task which is an internal exam based on the "Common Internal Assessment" that is completed in Year 12. This is our first try at this style of exam and we have been preparing and practicing all term. Week 4 sees classes complete a "Mock" exam to prepare for the final exam which is in Week 5. Once completed, we will move on to the next task, a short story! So, it's full steam ahead in our English classes at the moment!

Social and Community Studies

In Social and Community Studies students are engaged in a unit on Indigenous Artforms. The students have been looking at many different forms of art, the impact art and artifacts have played in the indigenous culture as well as analysing and interpreting art work. This week the students were given their assessment task for the unit where they will be choosing a piece of art we have looked at in class and creating a multi modal presentation to show their understanding of that piece.

On Friday the 25th of August The BUSY Schools will be hosting "Wear It Purple Day" across every campus. Wear It Purple Day aims to raise awareness of, advocate for, and create a safe space for LGBTQIA+ youth. Dale from Plumbing Apprentices Queensland


