#### A note from the Campus Principal

Welcome to Week 8, this week I have several important reminders for families to ensure our high standards at BUSY are maintained and we finish the school term strong. Thanks in advance to all the parents and carers for your support on the below matters.

**School shirts**- The BUSY Shirts are to be worn everyday to school. This is not optional; it is our required standard. Students have become very lax with this of late, I am looking forward to an improvement in this area from next week.

**Mobile phones**- as per our student agreement that all students sign upon enrollment, mobile phones are not to be used in the classroom. As a team we are exploring options for consequences for students who habitually use their phones in class. Our stance on phones is allowing students to have phones and use them responsibly like adults by not using them during class. If we have students not stepping up as adults with phone use, we will look at a process to implement that may treat students less like adults and more like children. When a staff member asks a student to put away their phone, we expect students to respectfully comply.

**Duty of Care** Just a reminder that students must sign out before leaving early. As a school we have a legislated Duty of Care that students are in our care until the end of a school day or until we speak to a parent/guardian on the phone to verbally hand back that duty of care. Thank you for supporting our process with this and all of our other processes which all have the end goal in mind of getting our students work ready.

On a more positive note, it has been fantastic to see students working diligently on their assessments, classrooms have been a hive of activity as students are preparing for exams, rehearsing for multi-modal presentations, or working through problem-solving assessments.

#### Year 12 Essential English

This week in Essential English students have been acting on their draft feedback and finalising their scripts and PowerPoints in preparation for their vlog delivery. In classes this week students were reminded of the importance of being prepared for their presentation with the mantra, practice, practice, practice, as not only will rehearsing their scripts make them more fluent and confident in their delivery, but it also serves a self-editing tool as they hear the complicated sentences and grammatical errors as they say their script aloud. Practicing their script also ensures that time limits have been met and PowerPoint slide content and transitions are consistent with the script content. After presentations are recorded, we move onto the final stretch of the course, where we look at Australian short stories.

# Year 11 Essential English

Throughout the term students have been exploring some of the issues impacting the lives of Australia's First Nations people working towards assessment in the form of an exam. This week students sat the first part of the exam. In this first session they were given a previously seen written stimulus and responded via short answer questions. Next week the students will sit the second part of the exam where they will be responding to an unseen visual stimulus and again responding to a series of short answer questions.

6 Easy Steps to Finish Your Assignments Faster by Aaron – Teacher Aide

# 1. Follow the scaffold

Your teachers have worked hard to breakdown each assignment and have created a scaffold for you to give you the best shot at success. So, follow the scaffold that they have provided you and it will make things a lot easier for you.



# 2. Gather all your gear

Collect EVERYTHING you will need for the assignment you are working on. Getting up for supplies takes you off course and makes it that much harder to get back to your assignment.

# 3. Unplug

The constant blings and beeps from your devices can make it impossible to focus on what you are working on. Switch off or silence your phones or leave them in the phone lockers or the teacher's desk until you are done. If you are listening to music through your headphones to help you concentrate, switch your phone over to flight mode so then you aren't getting distracted by notifications every couple of minutes. Remember the messages will still be there when you are finished, you don't have to reply to them straight away.

# 4. Stay on task

If you are fact checking online, it can be so easy to get distracted by a completely unrelated site. Try to avoid the temptation to get sidetracked by games and or other websites. Just get your information and quickly switch back to your document that you are working on.

# 5. Take plenty of breaks

Active breaks are a great way to keep your energy up. Grab a drink or get up and stretch but try not to distract others who are doing their work. And stick to a break schedule, have a 5 minute break then get back into your work. 6 Reward yourself!

# 6. Reward yourself!

Doing assignments can be stressful, so once you are done treat yourself to a reward for all your hard work you deserve it. Treat yourself to a chocolate bar or some chips or a can of drink from the vending machine.
