What is Stress?

Stress is a response to external challenges, like deadlines or difficult decisions. Stress is normal, and it can sometimes be good. Most of the time, the things that cause stress aren't dangerous. Often, stress is caused by everyday things, like taking a test, getting called on in class, awkward situations, or having too much to do. Too much stress, however, can be overwhelming and it can make it hard for people to enjoy life. Knowing the signs of stress can help us know how to intervene, quickly and stay calm and focused.

Stress for teens

- School
- Social challenges
- Relationships
- Negative thoughts or feelings about themselves
- Extracurricular activities
- Work
- Transitions (eg. graduating, moving out, living independently)

Managing stress

Stress can be managed by talking with trusted people, spending time with friends or family, and embracing healthy lifestyle choices.

- Getting enough sleep
- Exercising regularly
- Listening to music
- Eating a healthy diet

- Practicing visualisation
- Calming breathing techniques
- Being organised

What if stress is too much to handle?

Most of the time, everyday stress comes from challenges you can face and deal with. But if your stress feels too strong, happens too often, or feels like more than you can handle, talk to a trusted person to get help and support.

BUSY Schools Youth Workers, Marney, Amber and Hannah are available at any time throughout the day in the chillout room and appointments can be made through our Youth Workers with our provisional Psychologist and Health Practitioner at BUSY Health, located near the reception desk.

GRADE 12 MATHS

How much cement do you need for a retaining wall?

Students have been faced with a massive problem; when building a large retaining wall, how much cement will be needed to hold the timber stumps in place?

For this real life problem, students were given a scenario where they had to solve the volume of 2 meter deep cylindrical holes in the ground, the volume of the cylindrical timber stumps, and the volume of cement that would fill the hole to hold these stumps in place.

The first few were easy... but when there were 32 to do... students went to the power of the spreadsheet to solve this massive problem in a fraction of the time.



Solving 2 & 3 Dimensional Shapes

To start the year, students are practicing their formulas. Remember $A = I \times w$ and $V = 1/2 \times b \times h \times H$ and the rest of them?

You'll be a little bit sympathetic to the kids this week for having to remember how to match up the right variables to the correct side of the shape and entering all the digits into the calculator in the right order, and finally, interpret the correct units.

You gotta love maths!

Designing & Painting a House

Students will be designing the shape and floorplan of a small house. They will need to apply their imagination and visualize the structure of their buildings and determine the size and arrangements of the rooms.

From there, they will determine how much paint would be required to cover the internal and external walls by calculating the area of the walls.

This can be a long and complex task but an excellent life skill to have.



11 ESSENTIAL MATHS



Term 1 this year Year 12 students will be working with ratios, rates, percentages, fractions and representing data.

When in life do we use ratios?

Who has a 2 stroke mower? Mixing oil with petrol is measured with a ratio. Ratios are also used when adding cleaning oils or chemicals to water, or splitting costs when budgeting for household food.

When in life do we work with rates?

Rates are part of everyday life. Wages are rates. With paid employment, you usually know your hourly rate, like how many dollars you earn per hour, for example, \$26/hr.

Think of the fuel consumption of cars. Some cars get 100kms/L. Or, how fast can you go down the highway? We refer to rates often. For example, the number of heart beats per second, cost of fuel per litre or cost of data per gigabyte.



Percentages are next and again, we use them so often.

When we shop, we are always looking for a sale and the discounts are often displayed as percentages.

Student exam results are also converted to percentages %.



The representation of data is the next topic on the agenda. Students learn to identify different types of graphs and interpret the data presented. It's a busy term, and attendance is so important to keep up to date for the final exam at the end of the term. Best of luck grade 11s!
